

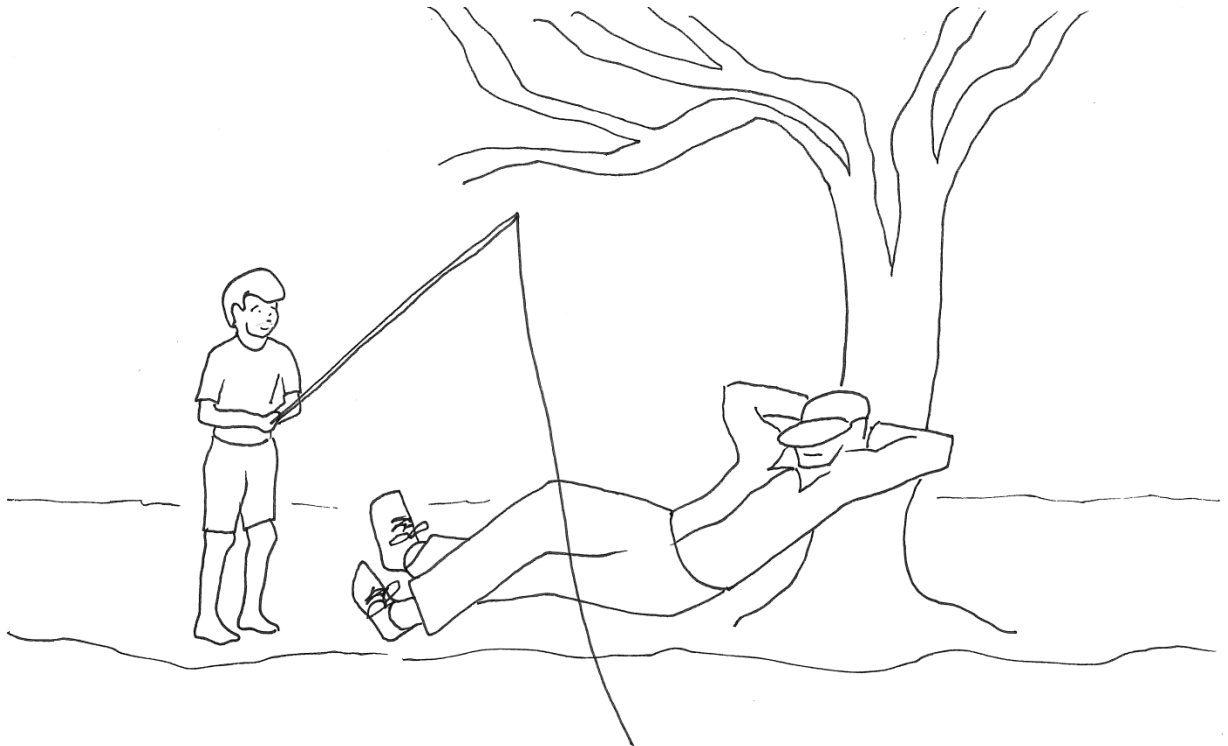

Historical Commission of Phillipston

The Historical Commission is having an all day picnic for Phillipston's 225th Anniversary on the common on Saturday, August 13, 2011. Our celebration will begin with a Meridian Gymnastic demonstration at 9:30 a.m. From 10 a.m. to noon, Richard Hamelin, The Pied Potter of Hamelin will talk about the history of pottery in and around Phillipston while demonstrating his craft. Blacksmith Joe Lambert will be on hand making "Iron Artistry". The farmer's market will have fresh produce for sale. The "Town Pound" will have local live farm animals and children may take a pony ride. Make a tin lantern in "The Kids' Corner" or try your hand at hoop rolling.

Senator Steve Brewer will recite "The Gettysburg Address" at noon. Visit the Civil War Encampment and watch their training drills. From noon to 2 p.m. children can try playing games that were popular around 1860. From 2:00 - 4:00 p.m. John Porcino will entertain us with stories and music. Everyone can enjoy an ice cream soda for only 25 cents, and Selectman Dave Bramhall has promised to present an antique car parade around the common.

Dignitaries from the past such as Anne and Charles Lindbergh, President Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt, Isachar Bates, Silhouette artist Ruth Bascom and John Phillip Sousa will be on hand throughout the day to tell us what Phillipston was like when they were alive.

Bring your lunch or buy a bag lunch on the common. Buy a commemorative 225th hat, T-shirt, and historical photograph postcard to take home as a memory of the day. The church will provide a chicken barbeque supper while we listen to some old time bluegrass and folk music. There will be something for everyone throughout the day. Make sure to catch all of the entertainment. We'll keep you informed as the day's events unfold.

When I was young in Phillipston -- By Gerry Balchuinas

Some of us had those new fangled plastic sleds and some didn't. My buddy had an old aluminum flying saucer, to slide down the hill. But we would use anything that was available to slide on, an old barn shovel worked great. Sit on the shovel and the handle between your legs and off you went. If it was an icy winter you could use the old radio flyer runner sled and really get going fast. Either way we were having a great time and it was good to be a kid in Phillipston.

The next morning brought a totally different scene. I got up and ran to the window, and I could barely see the mailbox by the road. It was snowing so hard, I was in awe! I asked mom if I could go outside and play and she said no. I couldn't believe it, she said no. She always let us play outside, and when it was snowing out too, so why was today so different? After a while even a younger boy could see why, it was snowing and snowing and it was really piling up. We were smack dab in the middle of one of the worst blizzards in history and I was seeing it firsthand. The wind was blowing and the snow was drifting, it was drifted to almost as tall as my dad in the front yard. The plow trucks would go roaring by and the snow would fly from them and it looked so cool. Mom said that she wanted us in the house so there was no chance of us getting plowed in and I agreed with her. Besides she said, you will all have your fill of snow when it is all over. It seemed to snow forever and all there was on TV was the talk and pictures of the snow. All 4 channels were nothing but snow talk. Yup 4 TV channels and maybe channel 25 on a good clear day with the antenna just right. So for now it was moms homemade hot chocolate a topping of marshmallow fluff and a grilled cheese, sitting under a hand crocheted blanket sitting by the wood stove in the living room, boy life was good.

The snow finally stopped and we were up and at them bright and early. There was no school and we knew it. We all waited for the whistle to blow to let us all know. You see in my day they blew the big whistle in Baldwinville at a certain time to let us all know that there was no school. Today mom said we could go out in the snow but she surely didn't say play. To the barn to feed the animals with dad and grab the shovels and start digging out. Dad fired up the tractor and did the big stuff but the small stuff was up to us. We shoveled all day and we still weren't done. The snow was so deep that you would throw it up and after a while you couldn't throw it far enough to get it so it wouldn't fall back down in your path. But after two days we were all shoveled out. Too bad we couldn't say that for the rest of the town. Dad jumped on the snowmobile and headed out to Rosellos store (Formerly Woodside now closed) to get a few things for mom. The town made it legal to ride on the roads with them and they were even asking for volunteers from snowmobilers for help with certain things. He was back in a flash and we had our supplies. He said that the roads were terrible and we would be snowed in for a few days. No school for at least the week, oh boy how could things get any better. The snow was too deep to even slide on the hills so we took to building a snow fort putting the barn shovels to a fun use. All the kids in the neighborhood came over and we all had forts and snowball fights, it was a lot of fun. Just a bunch of kids a field of white, and fun to be had everywhere. There wasn't a single video game, movie, Ipod, nothing and yet we were still having a great time and getting exercise and using our imagination at the same time.
