

Dear Friends, We recently traveled through Delaware to attend Sam Bennett's wedding and I remembered Jim Noles' book A Pocketful of History, Four Hundred Years of America - One State Quarter at a Time. One of the best stories in the book is about the Delaware state quarter, which shows Caesar Rodney on a horse, and was submitted by High school arts and drama teacher Eddy Seger from Caesar Rodney High School! I love the story of Caesar Rodney who was an American patriot and delegate to the Second Continental Congress, who was known for his patriotism, but not his looks. Our own Massachusetts delegate, John Adams called Rodney, "the oddest looking man in the world." Unfortunate Rodney's looks were affected by cancer which began with a cancerous sore on his nose and soon spread to the left side of his face. He also suffered from asthma, pleurisy, and gout, even back at the first Continental Congress in 1775. On June 28, 1776, a draft of the Declaration of Independence was put before Congress and required an unanimous vote. The Delaware delegation was split in half with Thomas McKean voting yes and George Read voting no. When the first vote on the resolution was taken on Monday, July 1, only nine colonies voted in favor. Rodney had been away at the time to deal with the Tories in Delaware, who were opposed to rebellion. After he succeeded in quelling the Tory force, Rodney returned home to recuperate. Meanwhile, back in Philadelphia, McKean was aware of Rodney's health, but also his vigor for patriotism, so he wrote a note to Rodney explaining that he was desperately needed. Rodney rushed back to Philadelphia travelling all night and arriving on July 2. The irony of history is that Rodney never sat for a portrait, because he was ashamed of his looks, but somehow on the state quarter it is his cancerous left side that is displayed.
