Monthly Articles About Our Beautiful Queen Lake in Phillipston

Summer is over!!!! South Beach benches and floats are gone and the Porta Pottie has been removed. We still have the beautiful fall weather with cool nights and sunny days. The colored leaves around the lake cast an autumn glow over the water. Sometimes the lake is like a mirror, reflecting this scene.

Our Queen Lake is considered a “Great Pond” by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The definition of a “Great Pond” is a pond which contains more than ten acres in its natural state, based on the surface area of lands lying below the natural high water mark. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency’s 2010 National Lakes Assessment finds that lakes with poor lakeshore habitat are three times more likely to be in poor overall biological condition than lakes with good quality shorelands. This shoreland vegetation protects the lake from the effects of polluted runoff, stabilizes the soil along the lake’s edge, and provides habitat, shelter, food, and cooling shade for fish. But a natural lakeshore does more than help the water quality of the lake and the quality of the its habitat; it helps the value of property along the lake, and it’s good business. Lakefront property generates millions of dollars in revenue. Studies show that when water clarity decreases, so do lake property values. Many lakeshore property owners unknowingly harm their lakes by replacing natural lakeshore vegetation with lawns, clearing out submerged logs and branches at the water’s edge, cutting down trees to get a better view, importing sand to make artificial beaches, building docks and “armoring” the shoreland with concrete or wooden bulkheads. This is why we MUST protect our beautiful “Queen Lake.”

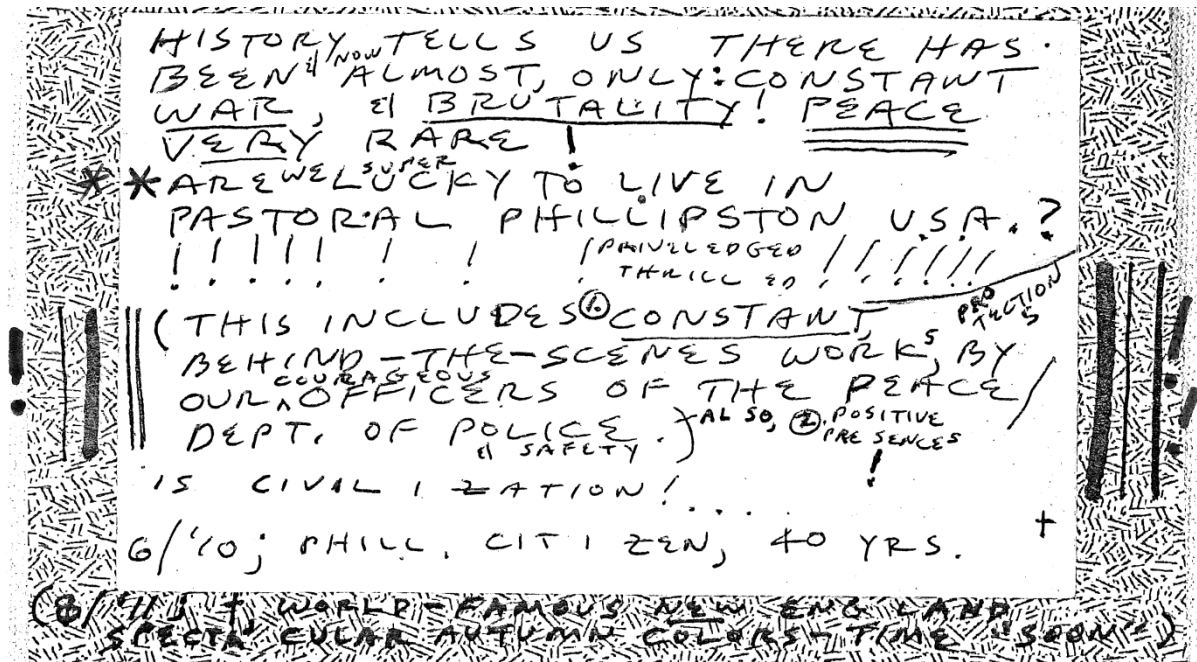

Signature Quilt Will Be at the Fall Fair

If you haven't had a chance to sign the quilt that will be an historic piece from Phillipston's 225th anniversary, you will have a good opportunity to do it on October 8th at the Pumpkin Weigh-In. Also, you can view some of the squares that Master Quilter Barbara Sanden has assembled with signatures previously signed.

The making of Signature Quilts has been an old American tradition, and to our knowledge, there has never been one made in Phillipston, so this first one will be extra important. Since the early 1800's when indelible ink was invented, these unique quilts have been a popular way to raise money while celebrating a special occasion. Many of the early signature quilts are now prized pieces in museum collections and have become valuable for genealogical research.

It will cost \$5 to sign a square, and your signature will qualify you to have your name entered in the raffle for the quilt, which will take place in December at the Memory Tree and Citizen of the Year Ceremony. The quilt design is a beautiful one and will be very precious filled with familiar names, a one-of-a-kind treasure. Be sure your name goes on that piece of history ... and you may win it!

Robert Bertin - Flora of Worcester County, Changes on the Land

Botanists have made extensive surveys documenting the flora of Worcester County over the past two decades. A comparison of these studies reveals many dramatic changes in the local flora involving both native and introduced species. Holy Cross Professor **Robert Bertin** will address these changes in our local landscape in his presentation, *Changes on the Land: The Flora of Worcester County Past and Present*.

An affiliate of the Millers River Environmental Center in Athol, the North Quabbin Garden Club formed in 2006 to encourage interest in all phases of home gardening. With efforts to promote better horticultural practices and foster civic beauty, emphasis is placed on use of native plants, organic gardening, and the conservation of natural resources. Monthly meetings are usually held on the third Thursday evening of each month featuring informative speakers or workshop sessions. Members are currently working on a wildlife habitat garden at the Millers River Environmental Center and planning their annual spring sale of perennial plants and specialty items. Guests and new members are always welcome, so join us this month and learn something new about gardening. Meetings are free to members and guests are asked for a donation.
